STATE MEDICAL SOVEREIGNTY

AN ACT

relating to amending North Carolina General Statute Chapter 891, S-2, §130A

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA:

SECTION 1. Public Health Law of North Carolina is amended by adding new clause “§130A-159” as follows:

§130A-159 in this section: “State Medical Sovereignty” means the State of North Carolina will not recognize, adhere, or be subservient to any extraterritorial national, international, or global entity which enacts, recommends, or enforces policies and/or products and/or services that violate North Carolina General Statutes Chapter 891 Section 2 §130A-156 “Medical Exemption”, Chapter 891 Section 2 §130A-157 “Religious Exemption”, Chapter 891 Section 2 §130A-158 “Restitution required when vaccine spoiled due to provider negligence”, and Chapter 891 Section 2 §130A-158.5 “Access to North Carolina Immunization Registry”.

SECTION 2. In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Amendment of “State Medical Sovereignty” should be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions contained herein shall not in any way be affected, impaired, prejudiced or disturbed thereby.

SECTION 3: This act is effective when it becomes law.
